8. Meeting Guidelines and Overall Understanding.

Discussion Item

Albert: I wanted to talk about UCADAN.

<u>Victoria:</u> We would love for our meetings to start at 11AM so we don't go over time. A long meeting doesn't mean unproductive meeting but sometimes it takes long because we take long to start. Secondly raise your hand if you have questions about anything. There's no stupid question. Overall understanding is it's frowned upon if you talk over someone. Speaker's list is great. Ryan's good at that. Be aware of what you're saying and those around you. Try to not say ridiculous things. First thing that comes to your mind, think it over.

<u>Albert:</u> Don't be discouraged to ask somebody to raise their voice. Noise quality isn't great here. Just use "point of personal privilege" so you can participate fully.

Mira: If someone corrects you on something, do so respectfully. If something's bothering you that someone said, it's okay to come to me and so I can maintain a safer space for everybody if you don't want to directly say something to them, I can say something on your behalf.

9. BIRT _____be ratified to the Appointments Committee for the 2017-2018 term. (Kourtis/Schweiter)

<u>Meng:</u> The College has a number of various committees and spaces reserved for students to share their voice. The Appointments Committee serves to review any new faculty appointments to the college. Faculty members can choose to affiliate themselves to specific colleges or their in house programs. If you are interested in potentially new UC faculty this is the one to sit on.

The Creative Writing Committee is to choose submissions. You're part of the review process.

The Curriculum Committee looks at changes to courses and new courses. For those programs housed at UC, if professors want to start a new course, they'd have to justify it to the committee.

The Scholarship Committee involves being part of the decision process for in course scholarships, graduating scholarships, or a combination of both.

I want to clarify that the point of sitting on this committee is not meant to promote these. These positions are to review applications, not to engage in promotion or creation. Also to clarify, most of the scholarships are open to international students. Scholarships that are not for international students are often provided on a UofT wide level.

<u>Aidan:</u> The leadership awards are available on the UC website and if you're intending to apply you cannot be on the scholarship committee. Also, I was on the scholarship committee last year but I didn't do too much because there's a need to be free in the summer.

<u>Meng:</u> To clarify that's not typically the case, usually scholarship committee reviews at end of semester, typically all this work happens in the school year.

13. Open the Budget (Hoang/Proctor)

Albert: It's largely to move an expense to capital. "Diabolos' is requesting \$350 to go towards the purchase of a new grinder. We have used the same drip coffee grinder for years. It's been around since before Andrea's time and has, unfortunately, ground its last bean this week. The machine was spitting out entire coffee grounds and refused to grind any beans when we made the grind smaller. While we could hypothetically repair this machine, the costs associated with it would be similar to buying a new one. A barista from De Mello that's now working at Diabolos', George, has informed us that a specific kind of machine he knows of would be relatively inexpensive to other grinders but would serve the purpose all the same. Andrea, last year's manager, suggested purchasing a new Bunn grinder, but this is considerably more expensive and very large. A Baratza machine, suggested by George, is much more cost efficient and works well for our purposes. Purchasing a new grinder is critical to Diabolos' operations as a coffee bar. Currently, we cannot sell drip coffee due to the broken grinder."

<u>Albert:</u> This won't impact the budget because it's in the capital budget.

Raye: I used the cheque register to update as of Tuesday but there are some expenses that haven't been updated.

Mira: Can we make amendments as we go along?

<u>Albert</u>: Can we have a 5-10 min recess?

Ryan: Split it to a 7.5 min break?

- i. Dan proposes a decrease on Line 1102 from a balance of \$3150 to \$1500 because of an increase in revenue.

Dan: We made more money than expected!

- j. Sara proposes a decrease on Line 902 from \$100 to \$0.
- k. Ben proposes a decrease on Line 402 from a balance of \$920 to \$385.
- I. Victoria proposes an increase on Line 201 from \$1631.84 to \$2181.84, and decreases on Line 202 from \$250 to \$0 and Line 205 from \$300 to \$0.

<u>Victoria:</u> Only a portion of these have been used to pay for the UC Follies because they want to purchase the rights to a script to a show but have trouble doing so because of the amount in their account because of last year. Also, their funding doesn't come out until October. The rights are \$3000.

<u>Aidan:</u> What is the play?

Victoria: Spring awakening.

Mira: First years: don't be intimidated by this process.

BIRT the above a. to I. are approved as an omnibus motion.

Moved \$725 to contingency.

14. Residence Involvement Representative Initiative (RIRI)

Dan: In the summer we talked about the social media policy this year. The process for the commissioner to post would be to talk to deputies or me. If you want to post something, draft it up and let me know, and let AJ, Mahreen, Aidan, Aster or Sameer know.

Danielle: Is that the same for creating events?

Dan: So I'm cutting you guys some slack because it's frosh week, but I was very disappointed at everyone, including myself for my commission-meeting event being posted only 4 days in advance. Events should be posted at least, or preferably, 14 days in advance. If you can't post them early, people won't see it. Please have all your posts/events submitted by the 28th. Also I found out when you post on the UC Lit calendar sometimes it's posted on your personal calendar. Just double check when you create an event that it's on the UC Lit calendar and includes a location so I know where it is.

<u>Victoria:</u> I realize that all of council is looking at it too so if you can specify a time as well, just so Lindsay, my deputy, knows for JCR bookings too, so events won't overlap.

<u>Albert:</u> There are issues to be combatted. These representatives are paired with house president. They meet monthly and discuss how to collaborate, ways to increase turnout, meet students in residence, and meet students by extension. Dan's really taken initiative to take charge of this.

<u>Dan:</u> I met with Adrian the SLC and Colin the Residence Life Coordinator. For now it's one rep to one house. It's upper year, mid year and UTSU representatives. Once we know what works and doesn't work, I'd like to add the first year reps to this. I'm going to send info over.

<u>Aidan:</u> How does nomination process work?

<u>Dan:</u> I already assigned you guys. Also point of order, I can't nominate people who aren't here right?

Ryan: No you can't.

15. UTSU's UCommute Campaign Endorsement (Constantinescu/Ferreira)

<u>Aidan:</u> How long do I have Ryan? I received a letter from UTSU. Anne worked really hard over the past summer to put this together. She sent letter to us to motivate.

Aidan reads letter:

Hi :) First of all I just wanted to say that it means so much that there would be a motion to endorse U-Commute at UCLit. My heart is happy.

I'll just give a brief summary of the campaign thus far, and what the plan is from here: We've hadpreliminary meetings with stakeholders, and they've been surprisingly very

positive and fruitful. Meetings we've had so far have been with municipal members on the TTC commission, the TTC commission chair, the director of policy at the Ministry of Transportation, some provincial members (for support), and each of our university administrations. I'm cautiously optimistic moving forward.

Our survey has just gone offline, and if you've filled it, THANK YOU--we got over 16000 responses! The results will be really important pieces come negotiations. Given the high turnout, we'll be able to present accurate info.

As for the next steps, we're looking toward the negotiations. If we can reach something both we and the transit providers agree to, then we go to referendum to incorporate the pass as an ancillary fee, and it would be in effect Fall 2018. The referendum will be a really big push, and we'll be running some type of "Yes" vote campaign with students & student groups in support of the price point.

As an aside, the survey data will be evaluated this upcoming week. At that point we'll have a rough idea of how expensive the pass should be, but the ballpark is roughly just over \$200 a semester. It may seem like a lot, but transit systems like Guelph who, for example, rely heavily on students to stay in business and don't serve that great of an area (it's Guelph Imao) charge \$120 and it's going up to \$130 in the winter. I just want to put this out now, so that people don't think we're trying to pretend it'll be really really cheap or something. Exact numbers we'll be negotiating can be provided as soon as we set them!

I hope you all choose to support the campaign, and I'd love to answer any questions people might have! We'll have a Facebook page up and running shortly where we'll be posting updates often, and I'm always around. If you have questions right now, you can call me at 705-262-9453

Sameer: They're trying to get a Metropass for every student?

Danielle: Can you opt out?

<u>Aidan:</u> This works like the health insurance plan, and the money that's saved will go to individuals that use it. The TTC makes them buy in bulk. Plus U of T is an 80% commuter school. Over 50% of students use local or regional transportation to get to school.

Mahzeb: Aren't they getting rid of the Metropass?

<u>Aidan:</u> I think like UTM, it wouldn't be a Metropass but it'd be like a Presto system for U of T students.

<u>Dede:</u> Would they be buying in bulk? And it's like an adjustment to Presto then?

<u>Aidan</u>: At UTM, you just show your T-card to get on board to busses, every student gets a card to tap on and tap off.

Olivia: Would it be like \$200 per semester?

Danielle: It's like 62 rides at \$3.25 per ride.

<u>Aidan:</u> Even though we're putting the motion in to endorse, it's not to say the consultation is over. You have myself, Anushka, Kshemani, and others who can bring feedback, questions, and concerns back to UTSU. All of your opinions are obviously valuable; it's a service we hope to be made use of by many students.

Danielle: In terms of timeline, is there something that could delay the process?

Anushka: Consultations could.

Mira: I'd like to speak in favour of the motion. As you know TTC passes are really expensive: \$116 or \$140 for an adult. This is difficult for students who are disabled or live with their parents. This is something that you'll seriously consider supporting because it makes campus more accessible. But it's a lot cheaper than \$500. I think it's important that we don't get caught up in the detailed \$200 per semester. It's important we consider that as it is and take it as a service level that helps folks who need the help. Mobility is really important in the city, this kind of thing is important to maybe not you directly but a hell of a lot of students.

<u>Albert:</u> As next year is an election, political figures will really want to get that vote. This campaign will be good for us to have a definite chain of action to support and figure out which politician would support this. With general politics in Toronto, I think there's a lot happening next year.

16. Campus Lion Clubs

Discussion Item

<u>Victoria:</u> Always thought Lions Clubs is a UC club but they're not. They basically go around making clubs. They're trying to find their place on campus, want to write up monthly reports with us.

Albert reads ULife Campus Lion Club brief.

<u>Victoria:</u> Delrina said only potential problem is that they have about 25% UC students making up their club which is low but they are looking and actively trying to engage more UC students but also other students. They're especially trying for the executive level for UC students. I'm bringing this up because I'm wondering if council is willing to have this new club even though they have a small UC community starting out.

Paul: From the description, it seems like they do a lot of stuff. What is their track record? What'd they do last year? I'd want something more concrete if we're supporting it.

Miranda: So I want to clarify what this means if we recognize it as a UC club?

Victoria: So they'd be recognized, they'd be able to ask us for funds, etc.

<u>Mira:</u> I want to ask if we can table this motion, I'm looking at the website and it seems a little pyramid schemey to me. They say they work for Habitat For Humanity. It's a little bizarre. I just don't understand it. I sort of wonder the degree to which the work is relevant to this space. I'd rather we take on something more grassroots rather than adhere to some international organization.

<u>Sameer:</u> The decision to make it a UC club isn't a small decision. We should continue to be strict on all the UC clubs. We should have them come with Delrina and present.

Ben: It's a similar structure in rotary clubs and Kiwanis clubs. I was in one in my youth. I wouldn't say it's sketchy but it's just how they operate. It functions as a club anyways now, so what difference does it make to become a UC club? I agree with Mira and Sameer.

<u>Victoria:</u> I just wanted to talk about them.

<u>Danielle:</u> Do they have space on campus specifically? At the ULife centre we pick clubs that are really active in the community, I've worked there for the last five months but I've never seen or heard of their name. It makes me worry that I've never seen this group pop up.

<u>Mira:</u> My issue is not that it's part of a larger organization; it's just that I've never heard of this organization.

<u>Albert:</u> I echo everyone's points. They should really give a presentation. It's a general principle of how we're going to go in the future. There are membership requirements. The actual points on what they have to provide us. The membership, how many people are in the club, and a regular updated member list. We'd make sure they actually adhere to that. It's not like how our ancillaries operate.

Anushka: I'd like to motion to table this. (Kurian/Schweiter)

<u>Mira:</u> This was in my initial budget, Ziigwin who's my deputy, her mom does cultural competency training, and I was just wondering if you folks would be willing to learn after the November meeting. She's super competent, knowledgeable, and wonderful person. We'd learn about competency surrounding various cultures. Everyone on council will benefit from this.

<u>Albert:</u> We can do it during our retreat. But then the issue is that it's at hart house farm.

Anushka reads letter regarding student from Mexico fundraising for her family post-earthquake.

Albert: The Red Cross has controversy; different Atlantic and Time articles have stated that the Haiti money donated has not gone to fixing things. I'm very critical of Red Cross and how their budget is actually used.

Anushka: Could we then somehow endorse the cause of helping people and the consensus of how we could go about that?

<u>Paul:</u> Maybe we could set up a meeting with core exec and Anushka to donating to Doctors Without Borders or another charity instead?

<u>Mira</u>: Our motion should read: "Upon future meeting to agree on where the funds may go." We should be careful not to go about noting conditions of support when talking to her. I'm sure she knows best; she's an international student from Mexico.

<u>Dan:</u> I have a point that I expect to be unpopular but I think someone needs to, I'm hesitant to directly support and release information related to charitable cause to something because it'll really show when we miss something and it's difficult to support everything. If UC students see that we support this and this, why aren't they supporting something in my country? I'm personally in support but I'm hesitant to support as UC Lit.

Raye: We have funds set aside for charity donations, I understand what you're saying about the different things to support, but we can say we have limited funds available.

<u>Anushka:</u> If something happened in India I would feel comfortable approaching my UC Lit because this individual came up to us to do so.

<u>Dan:</u> If we support this, I would ask if it's okay to support her and mention her directly, but we aren't just looking around at everything we need to support.

<u>Albert:</u> I think it's good to look at how we support globally.

<u>Paul:</u> Ways to support without directly contributing support financially, we can support by sharing posts, giving outreach. That's what we have. It would be a struggle doing it alone.

<u>Mira:</u> I think the point of highlighting this person individually like Dan said is a good idea. It's uplifting instead of being like "The UC Lit's doing so great."

New Motion 18: BIRT the UC Lit support the fundraising efforts of Eri Kimura Meguro online for her work to raise money for the natural disaster in Mexico following the September 19th Earthquake. By Sunday, our second production night will be on Thursday September 29: the theme is butch, we might have a photoshoot. Concerning the renovations taking place next year, we are in contact with administration and the core executive to ease us all into that transition.

UTSU:

Hi everyone! Hope you're easing into your new schedules well! We want to extend a special welcome to the first year reps – this whole meeting might seem like a lot being thrown at you all at once, especially when you factor the UTSU into your time on the Lit, but we (Kshemani, Anushka and Aidan) are all extremely excited to work with you, and to help guide you through the many facets of student politics here at UofT. The UTSU is your campus-wide student government; we work with student societies such as the Lit, and representatives from all the colleges and faculties, to provide services to students, advocate about issues facing students, and create events that build connections between students at this school. As we try to find and create more collaboration opportunities between the Lit and UTSU, we hope we can work with you specifically to increase students' awareness of the issues we do work on, especially yours! There are meetings you can take part in, campaigns you can give your ideas to, funds you can help create new events with, and your three UC directors, for you to ask any questions you have! Here's what's going on in our neck of the woods, in no particular order:

- 1. We've mostly been working on campus-wide initiatives thus far that would benefit UC
- students, but over the next months, since we're all about settled in to the new school year, we really want to begin working with a number of you on initiatives and priorities you and we have in mind to improve UC services specifically! Looking forward to beginning these discussions with you all!
- 2. While we were polishing up this report, Victoria out of the blue suggested the UC Lit plan an excursion to Halloween Haunt at Canada's Wonderland. Coincidentally, the UTSU announced it was partnering with Woodsworth College on a similar event, and they told us the door's open to similar collaborations with UC, so we're now going to spend the next week or 2 working with them to hopefully achieve something similar for UC students! Come out to the Campus Life Commission meeting, Wednesday night at 5, to help convince the UTSU!:)
- 3. The UTSU's Help Desk is rolling out starting tomorrow! It's an online and in-person service whereby you get to ask a few undergrad students we hired any questions at all related to academic and university procedures!
- 4. The UCommute survey, to get a subsidized transit Upass for all full-time undergrads, got over 15,000 responses! The information will be brought to the TTC to come up with a plan that works for most students in terms of cost, we know now that the UTSU won't negotiate higher than \$200/semester (and will aim for far lower). It will all be part of your tuition though counts for scholarship considerations! The referendum vote will be in March, but the UTSU's running some campaigns to raise awareness until then (including a commuter appreciation week in October/November), and such a major service addition necessitates broad campus support for it to go through, so that's why Kshemani has submitted a motion for the Lit to endorse the UConnect campaign!
- 5. Our Poverty & Decide the You Decide petition campaign. You Decide, which the Lit endorsed last year, is a petition to hold a referendum

on the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS) – a group for which UofT students pay \$15 a year (amounting to about \$500,000 annually), and was supposed to provide services to UofT students, but largely doesn't anymore, due to the UTSU finding options (such as your health plan) that provide more resources, and for less cost than the CFS was asking of us. Basically, they aren't necessary anymore for a school as large as UofT, but we're only still paying this fee because they make it incredibly hard for student unions to leave – we need 4000 signatures to even hold a vote. You Decide began last year, and got the signatures needed to have a vote on the federal arm of the CFS – we're now focusing on the provincial arm, and hope to have a vote on both (the first vote in 15 years) at the beginning of next school year. We hope you'll help us by signing the petition, raising awareness of the issue at hand and keeping abreast of coverage of the CFS' lack of accountability (the Varsity's running a series on their hidden bank account, please read it!).

- 6. On the subject of provincial advocacy, a number of UTSU representatives attended a roundtable on September 15th, run by MPP Han Dong, to get student input on the new OSAP framework (which is a nice step but isn't really "free tuition"). They'll also be meeting with the office of the Minister of Advanced Education and Skills Development to discuss their new International Student Strategy, and advocate to the provincial government to provide more services to international students considering their ridiculously high, unregulated tuition.
- 7. On Tuesday, September 26, at City Hall, UTSU will be speaking in support of Councillor Joe Cressy's motion to remove licensing exemption to fraternities and sororities. This would require these organizations to adhere to the same building upkeep and safety standards as any other tenant of a house, or risk eviction.
- 8. Orientation Fest was a success! The UTSU held its first ever Clubs Carnival, which combined the traditional clubs fair with a whole bunch of food trucks and inflatables to create a more fun experience! They also held the traditional night social, parade and pep rally (shoutout to all the UC froshies who led the cheers from the bleachers! Shame on Trin). They also provided frosh kits to colleges who couldn't pay for their own (so not UC though they did provide those pink reusable water bottles)! Please let us know if you had any concerns with how any of these events were run (especially the night social), and we will relay them to the orientation team.
- 9. The UTSU also held their Street Fest, where they basically brought the Clubs Carnival to St. George St., and provided tons of giveaways from our sponsors, some of which used yeti costumes to do so. However, owing to the UTSU's refusal to recognize the Students for Life anti-choice club, members of that club, some of whom were not even students, disgustingly protested the event with large, inaccurate signs meant to disturb and (re-) traumatize students and passersby out of abortion. Thankfully, a patchwork of student advocates (commendably led by Ellie Adekur and Silence Is Violence), UTSU board members, and concerned UC students worked together to block and drown out the anti-choicers, forcing them eventually to pack up and leave. These types of demonstrations, meant to shock and intimidate people away from a legal right they have to choose, as well as invalidate lived experiences or trauma, should have no place on this campus, but as long as Ulife continues to recognize this club, and St. Michael's College continues to fund it, we as concerned

students and student leaders should strive to be organized, vigilant and ready to respond when these bigots return to campus, as they have already.

- 10. On another unfortunate note, our VP University Affairs, Carina Zhang, resigned in advance of Orientation due to personal circumstances. Carina provided an endless amount of ideas for how to combat pressing student issues from a translated student handbook, to a poster campaign to end the laptop ban, to working with the university's new Associate VP, International Experience, to reduce cultural and financial barriers to international students at UofT, and to commencing a UTSU effort to provide free menstrual products to students. These initiatives will absolutely continue, and her foundations built upon, once her successor is hired in October/November. In addition to this work, in our short time working with her, Carina never failed to put a smile on our faces through her humorous and genial nature! (on that note, if you want a daily smile please follow her Snapchat babybabyzhang)
- 11. Our general equity director for trans students, Teddy Williamson, also resigned this month due to personal circumstances. Teddy has been a tireless advocate and demonstrator for trans student rights and awareness on campus he even worked with the UC Lit on last year's "Existence Is Resistance" campaign. We wish he'd been able to continue this great work this year on the UTSU.
- 12. UTSU's infamous Annual General Meeting is on Monday, October 30. This is where the UTSU's audit and financials get discussed, in addition to any constitutional amendments. We will fill you in when we find out what's on the agenda, though one item that is guaranteed to be there is a restructuring of the General Equity Director system, for which Chim Alao, VP Equity, spent the summer consulting with equity and service groups on campus to create a less tokenizing, more consensus-based system. He's expressed interest in holding an info session with the UC Lit on what exactly this entails, in advance of the AGM! We'll provide more details closer to the date. Please come out to the AGM, by the way there are free samosas, the chance to get really engaged with how your student union works, and free samosas!
- 13. Adrian, the aforementioned director for students in poverty, is working on securing the UTSU partnerships with both FoodReach (to provide clubs food ingredients at reduced cost) and Brands for Canada (to sell branded apparel at reduced cost to students). As well, he'll be filing a Freedom of Information request for scholarship demographic information from all colleges, to begin an intercollege advocacy plan to advancement departments to fundraise for more needs-based scholarships for students. This is an initiative we ran on, so we're glad he thinks alike! Once data is compiled, he will approach all college societies, including the UC Lit, for collaboration.
- 14. Chim and Ziigwen (Mira's deputy who is also the UTSU's Indigenous students director) held Indigenous cultural competency training for the Board, led by Kelly Brownbill, on Sep 19 and 20. The training began as an overview of Anishinaabe cultural philosophies on land use, clan and family structure, and spiritual relationship; led into another overview on how European colonists committed genocide against Canada's Indigenous populations; and tied everything back together with a call to action on reconciliation and education, which we pledge to incorporate into our work on both of our organizations.

We thank Ms. Brownbill for her really engaging and sincere presentation, and thank Ziigwen and Chim for putting it together to help create a more equitable Board!

- 15. Chim's also put together the Equity 101 campaign, which are those colourful cards on display in the UC Lit office, meant to provide introductory definitions and analysis, for those learning about equity and intersectionality, of a number of related terms and concepts. There will be a series of events related to the Equity 101 campaign keep your eyes peeled! Next week we're going to try and get these cards provided to UC's residence dons.
